Foodbank is WA's largest food relief organisation and help many low-income and vulnerable families in hard financial times. Foodbank has provided over 6.1 million meals each year to people in need, including over 30 000 children.

Over the next 4 weeks, there will be collection box in our front office. We ask our wonderful community at APS to donate to this box with any canned and nonperishable foods. For example, canned goods, long life milk, canned vegetables, canned fruit, canned meals, pasta, rice...

Chaplain's Corner

Its hump week!

Yay! said the teachers.

Yeet! Said the students.

And now that we are past the half way mark, I thought I would write briefly about gentleness.

Think of the things that you are most precious or gentle with? Maybe... a kitten? I-phone? a new bike or car? An old family photo? The latest gaming console? That package that you have been waiting for nearly six months to arrive?

When we are gentle with something we are showing that we value it, that we care for it. It is the outworking of our desire for its best. Our actions (no matter how hard we try) can't help but speak about our true selves and our values. The year sixes would know that our National, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Flags are precious and have great value. Because of this the flags themselves are to be treated in a way that honours what they represent, the result is that the flags must not touch the ground. Not only do the flags receive gentleness and honour but they are now a mirror of what we value.

What if we treated other people with the same respect and preciousness that we viewed our national flag (or gaming console, iPhone, jewellery etc.)? If we spoke and acted in ways that protected them and honoured them rather than treated them how ever we felt at the particularly time? If we were to be gentle with others, not just our friends and family but also the people we meet in the school yard, on our street and in the shopping centre, we would be valuing that which deserves infinite value, we would in fact be acting out of a heart of gentleness.

I can tell you right now that the world really needs more people who are strong and brave enough to be gentle with others. To be radical in the ways that we care and act, thinking not just about ourselves, but more importantly; acting and thinking in a way that puts our value in those people around us.

The act of gentleness is not something that we can put off and hope that others will be gentle on our behalf. It doesn't work like that. It is like any of the virtues, in that it does not lose its value in and of itself but the lack of it becomes a reflection on what we deem as important. The bottom line is this "For ourselves to be gentle, we must not view ourselves as better than someone else". So let us be gentle with others, let us metaphorically lift them up and not let them touch the ground.

On Thursday 3 June, all students in Year 1-6 will be competing in the annual house cross country. All parents, guardians and family members are welcome to attend and support their child/ren.

All students are required to participate. Please ensure that they wear suitable clothing and footwear. All students are encouraged to wear their house shirt. The day is scheduled to proceed as follows. We will endeavour to keep to this schedule, however, changes on the day may be necessary.

New courses have been created this year and can be viewed on the following pages. They have been designed to eliminate stairs and roads and to make it easy to remember for students as they move up through the years. Please note that due to the path between Campbell Road and the school ovals being used in the courses, parking there will not be available on the day of the event.

Scoring will also be run slightly differently this year. Points will be assigned as follows.

1st place: 50 points
2nd place: 45 points
3rd place: 40 points
4th place: 39 points

Every place after 4th gets one less point than the place before

This scoring system is designed to award all students for striving to achieve their best. All students will receive a time for their run and the student with the top time in each gender/year level group will be recognised as the record holder for their category. These times will be recorded as a goal for students in future years to try and beat. Medallions will be awarded to the 1st and 2nd place winners in each category. Certificates will be awarded to the top 10 placegetters. Presentations will take place at the end of each race.

Students have been given tips about how to perform well on the day as well as how to train for the event in PE lessons. These are summarised below.

- Training
 - Training 3 to 5 times per week is ideal, but anything is better than nothing!

- o Aim is to build towards running the whole event. The process to achieve this is to start by running as far as you can, then walk for approx. 30 seconds, then run as far as you can again and repeat this process for the full event distance
- On the day
 - o Go for a steady pace the whole way, DO NOT sprint walk sprint walk sprint
 - o Find your own pace in the race don't run with your mates
 - o Do your personal best

Training sessions will also be available for students who want to familiarise themselves with the course a little better. Sessions will start from the Start/Finish line of the course (goal posts nearest to playground on top oval). Dates and times of the training sessions are as follows.

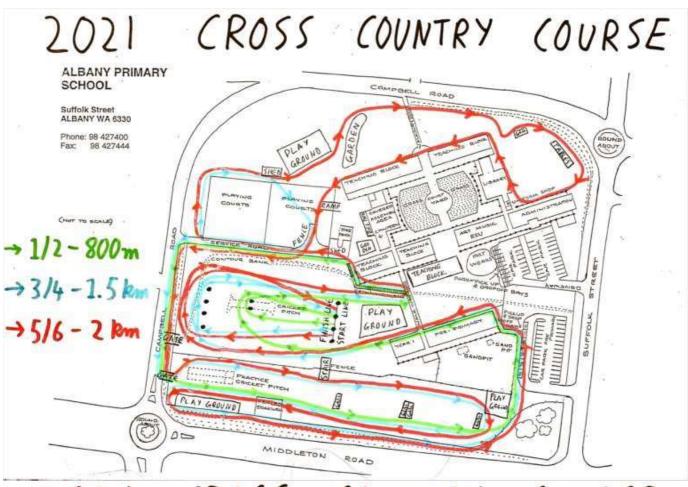
The event will proceed if weather is a little rainy. In the event of extreme weather, the event will be cancelled and moved to Friday 4 June.

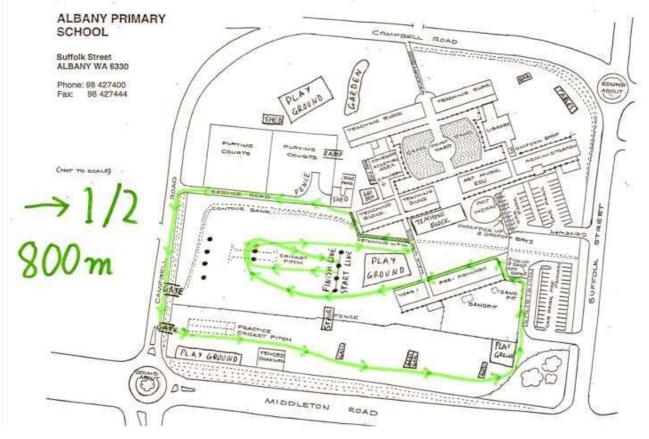

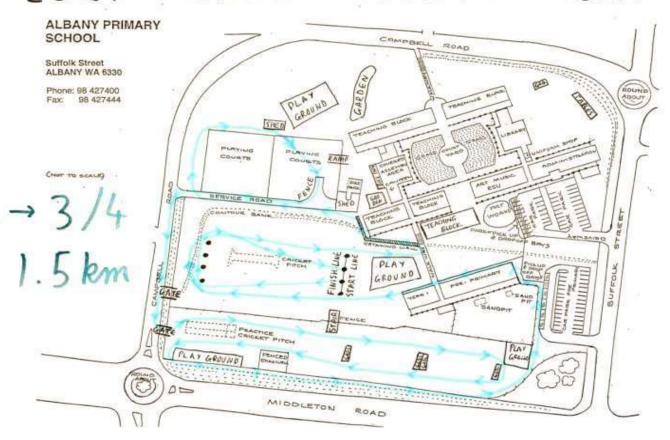

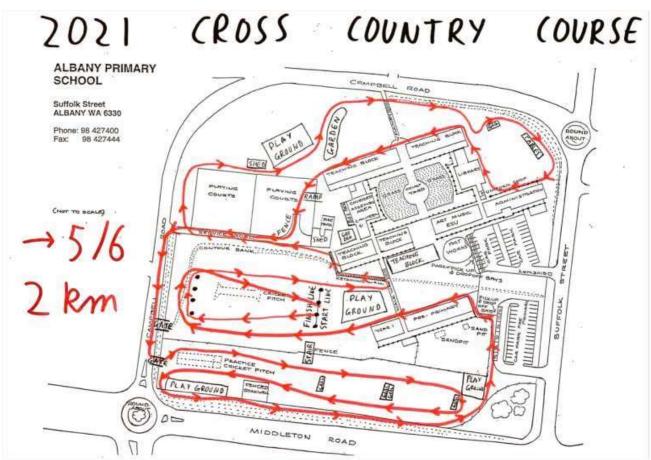






2021 CROSS COUNTRY COURSE

Transition to Albany Senior High School

We look forward to meeting with students in Year 6 from Albany, Spencer Park and Flinders Park Primary Schools in Week 7 this term. Our Year 7 and 9 Student Leaders and Principal Melissa Walker will have an initial visit with the Year 6 classes to introduce them to ASHS culture and to engage in some quality Q&A, while delivering Enrolment Packs to take home.
