carnival was a great success over the two days. The success of these events is due to a large amount of time our staff input to plan and run them. I thank all of our team who dedicate additional time to this for our students.


Planning 2022

Year 6 Rottnest Camp, October 2021



2021 JUMPS AND THROWS AND HOUSE ATHLETICS



Congratulations to all students who participated in the Jumps and Throws and Athletics events last week. It was fantastic to see students across both days working hard to earn points for their house. I believe that there are three main goals that all students should be striving towards on these days. They are achieving personal best, using teamwork and showing sportsmanship. I believe our students demonstrated all of these ideals, and from all reports, had a lot of fun in the process!

I was also very impressed with the gratitude demonstrated by many of our students who showed that they appreciated all the hard work that went into making these days successful. This was made clear by the biggest cheer of the day going to the parent helpers, to whom I would like to extend another huge thank you, we simply couldn't do it without you. I hope those who volunteered their time found enjoyment from knowing that they contributed greatly to making these days an awesome event for the kids.

This year saw a new approach to scoring where every place in every event mattered. The scores were awarded as follows:

- Individual events
 - o 50 points for 1st
 - 45 points for 2nd
 - o 40 points for 3rd
 - o 1 less point for every place after that (eg. 39 points for 4th, 38 for 5th)
 - o Note: the winner of a Division B event is considered 9th place, behind the 8 runners in Division A
- Team events
 - o 200 points for 1st
 - o 150 points for 2nd
 - o 100 points for 3rd
 - o 50 points for 4th
- Grand Relay
 - o 400 points for 1st
 - o 300 points for 2nd
 - o 200 points for 3rd
 - o 100 points for 4th



This new scoring system bought with it huge overall scores, so it was shocking to see how close some of the final scores were, especially in the senior carnival. Here they are...

- Junior Carnival
 - 1st place Clarence 5416 points
 - 2nd place Michaelmas 4874 points
 - 3rd place Melville 4493 points
 - 4th place Breaksea 4123 points
- Senior Carnival
 - o 1st place Melville 11359 points
 - 2nd place Clarence 11349 points
 - o 3rd place Michaelmas 11295 points
 - 4th place Breaksea 10871 points



It is at this point that I would like to remind all students that the houses are made up and the points don't matter, it's all just a bit of fun. What matters is the effort you put in, the way you worked as a whole school APS team to achieve great results and the sportsmanship you showed.

Chaplain's Corner

Are you a "Thermometer" or a "Thermostat"?

When I was younger someone who cared for me and took time to talk to me, challenged myself and some of my friends to be a thermostat.

Let me explain... When I went to school there was a thermometer outside the staff room and on the really hot days the students would crowd around it in hope that the thermometer would get up to 40 degrees. As a rumour had spread that if the school got to 40 degrees or over, then the students had to go home. This may have been true, but no one really knew for sure, but we lived in hope.

While in contrast, the staff room had an air conditioner which was controlled by a thermostat. In one way the thermostat did not care what the temperature was outside, as once it is set and decides what the room should be it then works hard to make that the reality. So, while it may have been hot outside, the thermostat was set to a nice cool temperature. This meant that the thermostat's job was to work to get the room to the desired temperature and once it was there, to keep it stable.

Looking at this example we can see that the thermometer is passive: it only reflects the surrounding temperature. While the thermostat is active: it actively works to change the room to the desired temperature.

So, what does it mean to be a thermometer? A thermometer is someone who reflects the culture around them. If the classroom or workplace is tense or full of strong emotion. Then someone who is a "thermometer" will also be this way. Whereas someone who chooses to be a "thermostat" will actively work to change the culture around them to where it "should" be.

Let's be honest, being a "thermometer" is the easier choice and really takes no effort at all, as it is only reactionary. We all know that feelings are infectious and that is why it is easier to go with the flow and be passive. However, it is important to note that when we are being passive we are not contributing anything new to those around us. While it is true that being a "thermostat" is hard work, it is also much more rewarding and has the huge potential to bring positive change into our own life and those around us.


