

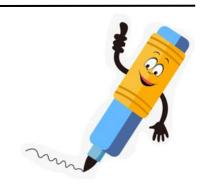

Thank You

A huge and sincere thank you to our parent community for embracing the mask wearing requirements and current Covid restrictions. I understand your frustrations around some of the changes in place. We are currently all in a bit of a circling pattern; we know there will be more restrictions coming, but when and what is a big unknown. As always, I will endeavour to keep you updated as quickly as I can with information as it comes to me.

You may be aware that schools are operating under slightly different guidelines to the general community. In today's newsletter there is an infographic explaining what a close contact is in a school setting.

Class Restructure

Thank you to our school community for your understanding and support of our recent class restructure. Whilst I know this was not an ideal start to the school year, it now means children are in much better class arrangements and can get on with the teaching and learning programs in a more seamless manner. I am glad we undertook this restructure at the beginning of Week 2, instead of waiting for another couple of weeks. Our students are all settled now and engaged in their learning programs.

Parent Information Afternoon

Although we have had to cancel this afternoon for parents due to the current restrictions for parents in classrooms, you will receive this week, via your Connect account, an information letter from your child's classroom teacher. Information about classroom procedures and our PBS expectations are contained in these letters.

We are hoping that in the future we can have another open afternoon for parents to visit classrooms. In the meantime, you are most welcome to speak with teachers about how your child is progressing in class. Please phone or email us to arrange a suitable time.

Lunch Service –Tuesday and Thursday

We are very happy to be offering a lunch service via the North Albany SHS canteen. This is a five-week trial to see if an ongoing service to our school is viable. Orders are placed through QuickCliq, as per last year. Please make sure you have updated the teacher and room number of your children.

We will keep you updated of changes after the trial period.

Media Consents

Today you will receive an electronic set of our Media Consent forms. It is a requirement for us to renew these each year to have permissions for publishing and to enable your children to access information technologies.

Please return these as soon as possible.

You will soon receive another set of permissions electronically, for Third Party Consents for any applications we use in school. These include class based programs and whole school programs used for the library, assessments, school photos, etc.

Shaping the future

School-based close contact in a high caseload environment

Testing and isolation advice for schools

Close contact definitions in schools

Face-to-face

At least 15 minutes faceto-face contact where a mask was not worn by the exposed person and the person with COVID-19. Small indoor space/classroom/no mask
Greater than two hours within a small indoor
space or classroom environment, where
masks have been removed for this period
by the exposed person and the person with
COVID-19 (note: others wearing masks in
this scenario would not be a contact).

Advised by WA Health Someone who is directed by WA Health that they are a close contact.

Confirmed positive case

Notify your school and isolate for a minimum of 7 days.

- At Day 7, if symptoms are present remain in isolation until symptoms clear.
- If no symptoms after Day 7, leave isolation and no testing is required.



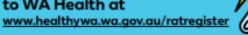
Symptomatic close contact

Notify your school, isolate for 7 days from date of contact with positive case, and:

Take a PCR or RAT test as soon as symptoms develop:

- If positive, refer to Confirmed positive case.
 You must report your positive RAT.*
- If negative stay in isolation, and if you used a RAT, take a second RAT in 24 hours and remain in isolation.
 - If then positive, refer to Confirmed positive case. You must report your positive RAT.*
 - If negative and no new household members have tested positive - take a RAT again on Day 7, before ending isolation if a negative result is returned.

*Report your positive RAT to WA Health at





Asymptomatic close contact

Notify your school, isolate for 7 days from date of contact with positive case:

- If symptoms develop, refer to Symptomatic close contact.
- If still asymptomatic, take a RAT on Day 7.
 - If positive, refer to Confirmed positive case.
 You must report your positive RAT.*
 - If negative, and no new household members have tested positive – self-isolation ends after Day 7, and people should monitor for symptoms.

Symptomatic (not a close contact)

Get a PCR test immediately and isolate until the result is returned:

- · If positive, refer to Confirmed positive case.
- If negative, not required to isolate but should stay home where possible until symptoms clear.

If you take a RAT because a PCR test is unavailable:

- If positive, refer to Confirmed positive case.
 You must report your positive RAT.*
- If negative, continue to isolate and repeat RAT in 24 hours - if negative after this followup test, you are not required to isolate but should stay home until symptoms clear.

P & C News

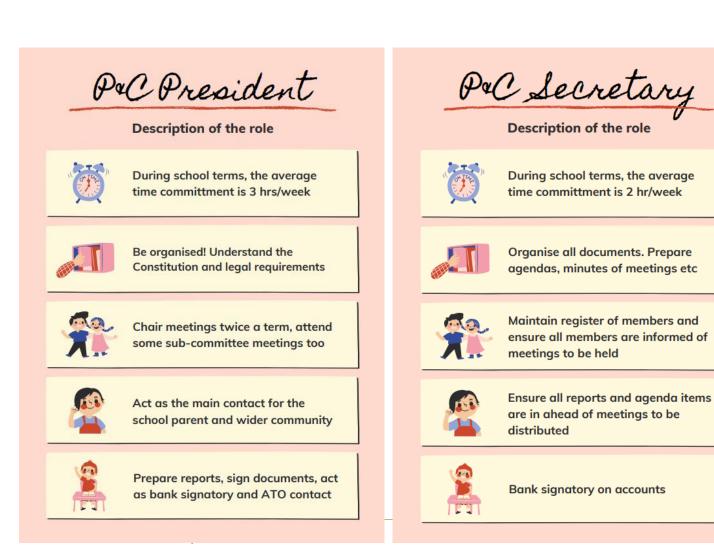
Our P&C AGM will be held on Monday 14 March at 7pm - venue TBC

A Note from the School Health Nurse

Welcome to the new school year.

My name is Rochelle Klose and I am the School Health Nurse who visits your school. School Health Nurses work in schools to promote healthy development and wellbeing so students may reach their full potential. A major part of my work is focused on early intervention and the School Entry Health Assessment program. Additionally, the nurse can be contacted at any time throughout primary school if you have concerns about your child's health, development or wellbeing.

School Health Nurses serve as a health contact point for children and their families, providing information, assessment, health counselling and referral. They also work in partnership with schools to support teachers in health related curriculum and can assist in the development of health care plans for students with complex and chronic health needs.

The services provided are free and confidential.
