### **Covid Update**

There are numerous communications coming from school via Connect with important updates around Covid and restrictions. Thank you to everyone for keeping abreast of these and supporting us in implementing mandates from the Departments of Education and Health. We continue to follow the latest advice from WA Health.

Our Years 3-6 students have been amazing in taking up the mask mandate. They have adapted extremely well. Thank you for your support of this.

Western Australia has moved to a very high caseload setting, effective Thursday 10 March.

An important communication was sent to parents via Connect on Thursday morning to inform you of these changes and their impact upon schools.

We are committed to keeping out school open and safe for learning. If your child is required to isolate, we will provide them with learning to do at home. If your child's teacher is required to isolate, your child may have a different teacher for periods of time. In some cases, we may need to rearrange extra-curricular school activities to ensure our teachers are in classrooms teaching.

I thank you for your understanding as we navigate the next few weeks, in what is anticipated to be a difficult time in our community.

We ask that all students come dressed in their green school shirts for their photos.

### Chaplain's Corner

It's Harmony week next week! So it seems a fitting time to talk about what it means and what it can look like.

Harmony is probably best thought of as two things that are not the same but that complement each other and help each other to reach their full potential. When I think of Harmony it's hard to get away from the illustration of musical notes but on paper that doesn't work well. So, I think a jigsaw puzzle will have to do in this instance.



A singular jigsaw puzzle piece might look pretty odd, it might look like just a smear of blue and yellow and this might make it difficult to comprehend what on earth it is. But though it looks unusual, when you find the right mate for it, something starts to click. Now imagine 500 of these pieces.

The glaring proof of this is the frustration we feel when we are missing the final piece. The puzzle might look mostly good, but it isn't quite right until the final piece is in place. And when that final piece is found, what was once a blueish yellow smear, is now part of the swirling heavens of our night sky. 



### Shaping the future

### School-based close contact in a high caseload environment Testing and isolation advice for schools

### Close contact definitions in schools

#### Face-to-face

At least 15 minutes faceto-face contact where a mask was not worn by the exposed person and the person with COVID-19.

### Small indoor space/classroom/no mask

Greater than two hours within a small indoor space or classroom environment, where masks have been removed for this period by the exposed person and the person with COVID-19 (note: others wearing masks in this scenario would not be a contact).

### Advised by WA Health

Someone who is directed by WA Health that they are a close contact.

### Confirmed positive case

### Notify your school and isolate for a minimum of 7 days.

- At Day 7, if symptoms are present remain in isolation until symptoms clear.
- If no symptoms after Day 7, leave isolation and no testing is required.



### Symptomatic close contact

Notify your school. Quarantine for a full 7 days from the last date of contact with positive case; and take a PCR test or a RAT on Day 1 or as soon as possible:

- · if positive refer to Confirmed positive case
- · if negative PCR, continue to quarantine
- if negative RAT, continue to quarantine and take RAT in 24 hours
- if RAT positive refer to Confirmed positive case.
   You must report your positive RAT.\*
- · if RAT negative continue to quarantine.

### Take a PCR test on Day 6 or a RAT on Day 7:

- if positive refer to Confirmed positive case.
   You must report your positive RAT.\*
- if negative and no new household members have tested positive – quarantine ends after Day 7, and people should monitor for symptoms.

### \*Report your positive RAT to WA Health at www.healthywa.wa.gov.au/ratregister



### Asymptomatic close contact

Notify your school. Quarantine for a full 7 days from the last date of contact with positive case; and take a PCR test or a RAT on Day 1 or as soon as possible:

- if positive refer to Confirmed positive case
- · if negative PCR, continue to quarantine
- if negative RAT, continue to quarantine and take RAT in 24 hours
  - if RAT positive refer to Confirmed positive case.
     You must report your positive RAT.\*
  - if RAT negative continue to quarantine.

### Take a PCR test on Day 6 or a RAT on Day 7:

- if positive refer to Confirmed positive case.
   You must report your positive RAT.\*
- If negative and no new household members have tested positive – quarantine ends after Day 7, and people should monitor for symptoms.

If symptoms develop, refer to Symptomatic close contact.

### Symptomatic (not a close contact)

Get a PCR test immediately and isolate until the result is returned:

- if positive, refer to Confirmed positive case
- if negative, not required to isolate but should stay home where possible until symptoms clear.

### If you take a RAT because a PCR test is unavailable:

- if positive, refer to Confirmed positive case.
   You must report your positive RAT.\*
- if negative, continue to isolate and repeat RAT in 24 hours

   if negative after this follow-up test, you are not required
   to isolate but should stay home until symptoms clear.





Ocean Heroes is a Western Australia based charity that aims to improve the wellbeing of those living with Autism and their families through surfing. We combine compassion, skills, and patience to provide the thrill of catching a wave in a free and unique one-on-one experience. Ocean Heroes was founded in 2016 by Sam Moyle, Luke Hallam, and Tom Johnston, who saw a much-needed gap in the Autism community. There are currently no equivalent organisations like Ocean Heroes in Western Australia.

Since it's inception, Ocean Heroes has provided this unique opportunity to over 5,000 people living with ASD, with regular events held across Perth, regionally in Denmark, Esperance, Geraldton and Broome, and interstate in NSW and VIC. Currently, we hold monthly events in Perth between September and April, catering for up to 150 participants at each event. Our goal at Ocean Heroes is to provide more people with ASD the thrill of catching a wave.

March 2022 sees Ocean Heroes coming back to the **Esperance** community for the second year running, holding a two-day event at Twilight Beach on Saturday 26th and Sunday 27th. This event is proudly supported by Telethon, Southern Ports and Mt Burdett Foundation. These events provide a unique opportunity for the autism community to experience the thrill of surfing in a fun, safe and supportive environment!

Next stop on the calendar sees Ocean Heroes venture west to **Albany** on Saturday 2nd April, then **Denmark** on the Sunday 3rd. These events are proudly supported by Telethon, and Southern Ports. The two consecutive weekends will bring together the autism community, surf community, and the broader volunteering community for fun-filled salty days at the beach!
